



### **Toffee Chip Bugleweed**

#### **Description:**

Gold and cream variegated margins really make this groundcover stand out, yet this bugleweed won't grow out of control; line the edges of pathways to light up under the moonlight or plant under shrubs and trees to brighten shady areas

#### **Ornamental Features**

Toffee Chip Bugleweed's attractive tiny glossy narrow leaves emerge khaki (brownish-green) in spring, turning grayish green in color with showy gold variegation the rest of the year. It features tiny spikes of blue flowers rising above the foliage from mid to late spring. The fruit is not ornamentally significant.

#### **Landscape Attributes**

Toffee Chip Bugleweed is a dense herbaceous evergreen perennial with a ground-hugging habit of growth. Its relatively fine texture sets it apart from other garden plants with less refined foliage.

This plant will require occasional maintenance and upkeep, and should not require much pruning, except when necessary, such as to remove dieback. It is a good choice for attracting butterflies to your yard, but is not particularly attractive to deer who tend to leave it alone in favor of tastier treats. Gardeners should be aware of the following characteristic(s) that may warrant special consideration;

### **Planting & Growing**

Toffee Chip Bugleweed will grow to be only 2 inches tall at maturity extending to 5 inches tall with the flowers, with a spread of 12 inches. Its foliage tends to remain low and dense right to the ground. It grows at a slow rate, and under ideal conditions can be expected to live for approximately 10 years.

This plant does best in partial shade to shade. It does best in average to evenly moist conditions, but will not tolerate standing water. It is not particular as to soil type or pH. It is somewhat tolerant of urban pollution. Consider covering it with a thick layer of mulch in winter to protect it in exposed locations or colder microclimates. This is a selected variety of a species not originally from North America. It can be propagated by division; however, as a cultivated variety, be aware that it may be subject to certain restrictions or prohibitions on propagation.
